
Bioeconomy in the EU: A decade of policy

Bioeconomy: all sectors and associated services that **produce**, **use**, **process**, **distribute** or **consume biological resources**, including ecosystem services.

As such it is a natural **enabler** and **result** of the European **Green Deal transformation**.




Biomass production, supply, uses and flows in the EU

Innovative aspects


- Organic waste recovery

- New uses of biomass (e.g. energy)






Biomass flows in the EU

- The total supply of biomass in the EU-27 adds up to approximately 1 billion tonnes of dry matter of which 90% is produced in the EU.
- The share of biomass used from agricultural sources (62%) is overall higher than the share of woody biomass used (38%) in the EU, however, shares vary greatly between Member States.

Bioeconomy as key sectors of the EU's economy



- **8.3** % of the EU's workforce in 2020
 - ~75% employed in agri-food sectors.
- 4.9% of GDP
 - **~67%** in agri-food sectors


- Important innovations in food and other bio-based industries show the potential of the bioeconomy


Territorial dimension of the EU bioeconomy




